Canadian Captives To Get Supplies

MANILA, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Allied planes on a mercy mission will shower supplies Saturday on Japan's detention camps, where an estimated 32,000 Allied prisoners of war-1,000 of them Canadian-are held. .

Tokyo messaged General Mac-Arthur that Japanese Red Cross workers and aides from the Swiss and Swedish legations would leave today for seven major camps to help move internees to designated embarkation ports.
