## 102 MANITOBANS REPORTED SAFE

MANILA, Sept. 8. — More
than 600 of approximately
1,500 Canadian prisoners of
war thought to be in Japaness
hands have been recovered
and are due to reach Manila within
a few days. Names of 102 Manitobans in the list have been recleased
Some 300 have been freed in
Japan and are now on their way
here. The total recovered at
Shamshuipo camp in Kowloon, near
Hong Kong, was 389, of whom 30
have arrived in Manila aboard the
hospital ship Oxfordshire.

Those seriously ill among the men
freed in Japan will spend a few
weeks in the Marianas islands be
fore being brought to Manila be
cause the climate there is more
lavorable to convalescence.

With 300 recovered from camps
in Japar proper, about 800 are
still to be located as the area of
occupation is extended. The Canadian force at Hong Kong originally numbered 1,972 men and two
nursing sisters, since repatriated.

Twenty-six Canadians, members
of the Royal Rifles and the Winnipeg Grenadiers, were among 230
prisoners to arrive in Yokohama
Friday from the Nilagto prison
camp. They are being sent to
Manila from where they will be
returned to Canada as soon as
possible.

Pte. William P. Derhak was reported safe in Allied hands, with no further word available, his wife, Mrs. Pearl M. Derhak, 208 Berry st., told The Tribune this morning. She received a telegram Friday night. She last heard from him a week ago, when she received a post card dated Nov. 21, 1944. "He sounded cheerful." Mrs. Derhak said. She has heard regularly from him since the fall of Hong Kong, "about every six months."
Pte. Derhak enlisted in Sept., 1939, and served in Jamaica with the Grenadiers.

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Besides his wife, he has two brothers serving in the armed forces: Eddie in the navy, on the East coast, and Cpl. Pete, in army service at Fort Osborne barracks. An unconfirmed report states that Ptc. Omar James Runnells, 24, is safe in Allied hands. His mother, Mrs. Pauline Runnells, 303 Atlantic ave., received information this morning from Ottawa.

Pte Runnells enlisted in September, 1939, with the Grenadiers and served 16 months in Jamaica before proceeding to Hong Kong, where he became prisoner. He has two sisters, Mrs. F. Munz, 730 Jefferson ave., and Shirley Runnells, 303 Atlantic ave.
