

# 1,068 Canadians Prisoner, Jap Sources Report

OTTAWA, Sept. 14—(CP)—The army said Tuesday Lt.-Col. W. M. McA'Nulty, officer commanding the Canadian repatriation team in the Far East, has reported that the freed at the Japanese port of Yokohama will proceed to Manila by air with the exception of a few hospital cases which will be taken directly to the United States via the Marianas.

The statement said Japanese sources had told Col. McA'Nulty there were 1,068 Canadian prisoners in Japan proper and 370 in the Hong Kong area.

Col. McA'Nulty reported most of the men were in "reasonably good health" and their morale had remained "remarkably high." Everything required for their health and comfort was available at Yokohama, he said.

## BRITONS TO TRAVEL THROUGH CANADA

It was reliably learned here Tuesday that arrangements are being made by the British high

commissioner's office for transit through Canada of numbers of liberated British prisoners of war from the Far East.

It was understood that an unspecified number of British prisoners will be routed home by Pacific transport to Vancouver, across Canada by rail to Quebec, Saint John, N.B., and Halifax to board ships for the last leg of the journey to Britain.
