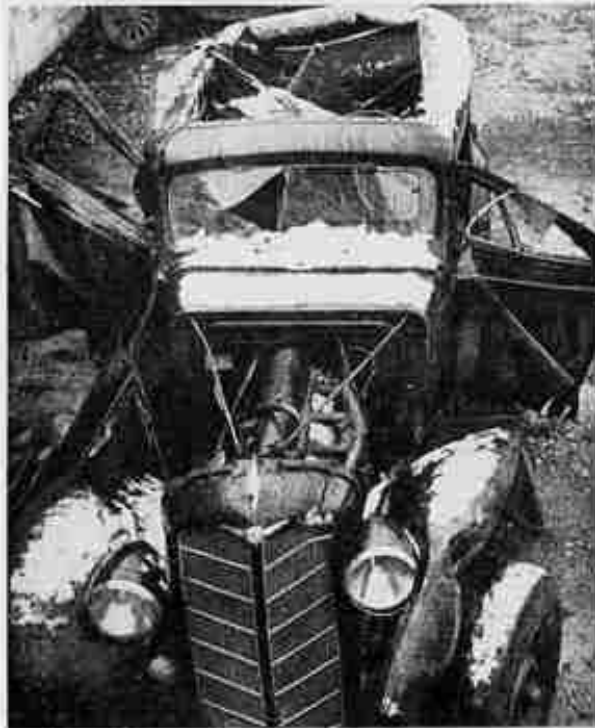


Two Men Killed in Crash

Death Car Stolen, Police Report

TWO MEN, recently returned from overseas, were killed shortly before midnight Wednesday when the car in which they were riding overturned in a ditch on No. 1 highway, five miles west of Headingly.

Head const. Phil Austin says the car was stolen from a garage in St. James, 22 1/2 miles west.

One of the men was killed as he tried to get through the air opening of a telephone booth. R.C.M.P. officers at the Headingly detachment and constable Richard Mann was on duty.

Phil Mann was found lying a short distance from the car. He was still alive when R.C.M.P. arrived at the scene about 11:30 p.m.

A coroner will view the body. The Department of Justice is in charge of the case but Mann was seen when it arrived.

The car belonged to R. W. Danks, 130 Murray ave., who has it in his brother's possession, Austin says. It was his garage which was the last place seen before the garage being set on fire.

Off. E. J. Hanson of the Headingly detachment, pointed out "the car was out of control." "They were about 100 yards from the ditch when it overturned," he said. "The car was out of control."

The R.C.M.P. officers said the highway is straight at this point. The accident was described by Peter Peter, 21, Franklin St., who stopped at Headingly and noticed the R.C.M.P. going 21:30 p.m.
