Grenadier Fails to Arrive Here

She supposed he must have got off at Brandon to make connections with Rossburn. The family has since moved to Winnipeg but the boy may not have known.

Mother had baked a cake with "Welcome Home" on its icing. Today she is taking a train to Rossburn to find her son.

Pte. Elmer McKnight, the Winnipeg Grenadier bandsman who wrote a song while a prisoner of the Japs, is safe, according to a personal wire received by his mother, Mrs. G. W. McKnight, Valour Rd.

"The twins, Gerald and Elmer, are both safe. But I haven't heard of Mel, the oldest boy, yet. . . . The song, entitled 'I'll Never Say Good-Bye Again, was heard in a broadcast from Japan and published by a man in Toronto. I heard since he's written another song, 'I'm Dreaming of Home, so he couldn't have been too badly treated," said his mother cheerfully.

Mrs. D. A. Pollock, West apts., is getting word almost daily from her son, Pte. John. The latest is the best: "Will be in Vancouver Monday."

Pte. Thomas H. Ford, whose sister, Miss Alice Ford, lives at 417 Maryland st., will have sad news to hear when it catches up with him: his mother, Mrs. Alice Ford, Carman, has just died and is to be buried Monday.

Two Winnipeg wives have been given return cable addresses by their husbands: Mrs. Norris, 168 Arlington, heard from her husband, Capt. John Norris, that she could cable him at Manila. R.S.M. O. C. Keenan, 21 Elm Park rd., gave his wife the address: Care of the Australian army base post office. Both men said they were well.

Mrs. M. Bertulli, 605 William ave., has heard from her son, Pte. Emile Bertulli.
