Cheering Grenadiers Reach San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12 .- (CP) .- Her decks lined with cheering liberated prisoners of war, including 70 Canadian soldiers captured at Hong Kong, Christmas Day, 1941, the U.S. transport U.S.S. Rixey docked here Thursday. The Canadians, members of the Winnipeg Grenadiers

and Royal Rifles of Canada, told of stories of starvation and brutal treatment while in prisoner-ofwar camps.

From the dock some were taken immediately by ferry to Fort Mc-Dowell, an island in San Francisco Bay, and others were transferred to hospital for medical examination.

The men have regained a con-siderable amount of lost weight, but still are not completely accusbut still are not completely accus-tomed to humane treatment and associating with the general public. Often they stand and stare at a person, giving the impression of being half-fearful of absorbing at

a moment's notice more brutal beatings.

Pte. A. H. Gootch, of Winnipeg, said: "What a fizzle that Hong Kong affair was! We didn't have a ghost of a chance. We were all alone without air or sea assistance, but we put up the hest fight we could the best fight we could. . . .

"It took the little Nips 18 days to take our little island despite their tremendous advantage in odds. If I had been them, I would have thrown in the sponge right

When asked about Red Cross parcels, Gootch said: "In our camp each man received four parcels during the entire imprisonment, but even then they had been openbut even then they had been opened and the cigarettes and chocolate removed. Later the Nips
would come up and tatalize us with
the stolen contents by eating it
right in front of us."
"Prisoners working in shipyards
would openly sabotage the building
of ships," said Pte. E. W. Cole,

"We would drill misplaced holes in the plates and whenever the Nips came across it they would laugh and ridicule us for being stupid and ignorant," he
